


FIRST NATIONS IN B.C: Science & Ethnobotany Unit K-10 Share Learnings in Action



Corbeau visite Victoria




A First Nations girl takes Raven, the creator/ trickster on a tour of several of Victoria's 1990's tourist localities. With very simple phrases and place

names, the visit is the entire plot. [Gr. 1]

2. Long Ago in Victoria


Victoria autrefois



Using black and white photos from the Royal B.C. museum and Victoria Archives, we revisit the city built on the traditional lands of the Coast Salish Nation.

Photographs from the late 1800's to the late 1900's show how much the city and the people have changed. Simple phrases and place names make this history easy to read. [Gr. 1-2]


3. First Nations Families Les Familles des Premières Nations



In this story, we visit ten Victoria area First Nations children and their families. These modern families of the 1990's reflect how many kinds of families we

now have. The child introduces us to each member of the family, tells what that member likes to do, and shows in what kind of housing the family lives. [Gr. 2-3]

4. Grandma's Special Feeling Grand-mère, gardienne de notre passé



Grandma teaches us how First Nations Peoples used plants. This First Nations family has a very special Grandma who remembers the many uses of plants in the forest and on the beach. She takes her family on an outing to Goldstream Park and teaches them how to identify several plants. She

then explains how many of the plants were used. An easy-to-read First Nations science text, the plants are shown in colour on the back page. Simple line drawings throughout the story illustrate how the plants were used. [Gr. 3-4]

5. First Nations Technology La Technologie des Premières Nations


In this story, First Nations technology of the past is contrasted with First Nations technology of the present. Many illustrations show how inventive First Nations people were in their



use of the environment. The addition of present-day technology shows how adaptive First Nations people continue to be. Housing, fishing, hunting, gathering, storing, clothing, carrying, transportation, cooking and ceremony are included. [Gr. 2-3]


6. Wait for Me! Attendez-moi!

Young Charlie is a First Nations boy who stops to notice what is going on around him. His older brother and sister, who are always in a hurry to get somewhere, call him "Turtle" and tell him to hurry up. But Turtle stops to see, hear and



smell. Throughout the story, the reader is invited to guess what Turtle finds and puts in his bucket. All is revealed in the end as Turtle shows his family his "treasures". Even his brother and sister are convinced that it pays to be more aware. Grade 2-3 level with phrases that repeat. This story will also appeal to older children who may have difficulties reading. [Gr. 2-3]

7. Little Bear's Vision Quest La Quête Spirituelle de Petit Ours



A full colour story book that teaches respect for others. The paintings were done by Joe Silvey (Salish). The book deals with name calling, initially showing the main character, Little Bear, as selfish and inconsiderate of others' feelings. The book is a modern First Nations legend applying the traditional method of using stories as a teaching tool. Little Bear learns to value the traditions of his ancestors and through the daily ritual of cleansing himself becomes in tune with nature. The book can be used by teachers, parents and other caring adults to teach children the value of respect. Discussion questions are included for parents and teachers. [Gr. 1-4]

About the Artists


Judy Bourne

Part Cree Indian, mother of six, outstanding educator, international volleyball coach, Judy Jerome Bourne was born on Valentine's Day, 1940, in Saskatchewan. She died on December 30, 1989 in Victoria, B.C.

She overcame extreme hardships in her young life and decided to live her dreams. Her last five years were spent as executive director of the M'Akola Housing Society on Vancouver Island.

She gave generously of her energy to help provide programs and shelters for young people in crisis, boarding homes, homes for unwed mothers and transition homes, and was an outspoken critic of the government. Judy lived a basic belief in "the humane quality that exists within us to help those less fortunate than us."

Roy Henry Vickers

Roy is a West Coast artist who has gained an international reputation for his uniquely graphic style in painting, as well as for his design interpretations in cedar and other mediums.

Roy was born in Greenville, B.C., in June 1946. His mother was a schoolteacher of British ancestry and his father a Tsimshian fisherman. For a time, the family lived in the ancient village of Kitkatla, later moving on to Hazelton, and finally to Victoria. Roy's interest in his Tsimshian ancestry led him to the Gitanmaax School of Northwest Coast Indian Art at Ksan, in

Hazelton on the Skeena River. With time, his skills increased and his work gradually moved away from the traditional style of the Tsimshian toward his own very unique and readily recognizable style. Since 1986, Roy has displayed his work in the Eagle Aerie Gallery (which he owns) in Tofino on Vancouver Island, and which was constructed along the lines of a Tsimshian longhouse, with a carved and painted house front and carved interior poles.


