


Celebrating the 38th year of the Indigenous Education Department Recognition Ceremony

Camryn Willier



On Canada's 150 birthday, a local business called Cold Comfort Ice Cream wanted to do more to acknowledge that First Peoples have been connected to the land we know call Canada since time immemorial. To raise attention they displayed a sign on their business that said "Cold Comfort would like to acknowledge that we have been working on the traditional Lekwungen territory of the Esquimalt and Songhees people for the last seven years. INDIGENOUS PEOPLE HAVE BEEN STEWARDS OF "OUR" HOME ON NATIVE LAND SINCE TIME IMMEMORIAL. Moving forward, in the spirit of reconciliation, all proceeds from sales of scooped ice cream at Cold Comfort on July 1st will go towards creating a culinary bursary for an Indigenous high school student in our community." It was immediately obvious hundreds of people felt similarly and wanted to help. So on top of ALL sales on that day many from the Victoria community donated towards the Cold Comfort Culinary Arts & Trades Scholarships.

WE RECOGNIZE THAT INDIGENOUS PEOPLE HAVE BEEN HERE SINCE TIME IMMEMORIAL. Moving forward, in the spirit of reconciliation, a portion of our profits from this event will create a culinary bursary for an Indigenous high school student in our community." The Hot and Cold Café also felt strongly about this, and the two businesses came together to create the "Lifting Each Other Up" Culinary Arts and Trades This Scholarship is for an Aboriginal woman or two-spirited person entering a

She was always concerned about her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren being supported at the schools. Freda also shared the voices and perspectives of the many youth she worked with at the Youth Custody Center and as a volunteer for street youth downtown. She exemplified dedication, commitment and honor and she role modeled what it means to be of service to the community. Freda was known as the T-Bird momma as she supported the T-Bird Soccer Clubs for 40 years.

Robert dedicated his life to both non-status and status First Nations. Robert negotiated with the Greater Victoria School District for two years regarding the Victoria Native Indian Education Commission and Victoria Native Education Council. In 1980, his negotiations lead to the development of the Native Indian Education Division, now known as Aboriginal Nations Education Division. Robert facilitated the 1980 inaugural First Nations Graduation Ceremony at Pearson United World College.

Lukas Dick

Lukas is a student with ancestry from the Songhees Nation and is graduating from Esquimalt High School. He was chosen for the Lacuse Robert Warren Trades Scholarship because of his strong academics, athleticism and interest in post-secondary trades programs. Nella Nelson Legacy Academic Scholarship

In 1972, Nella moved to Victoria to study at Camosun College and soon transferred to UVIC to pursue studies in Anthropology and then Education. Upon graduation, Nella began a lifelong career as a teacher with the Greater Victoria School District working as a high school history teacher and counsellor for ten years at S.J. Willis Junior High, Central Junior High and Victoria High School then becoming the District Administrator for the Aboriginal Nations Education Division in 1988. In June 2018 Nella retired after over forty years of ground-breaking and thriving educational leadership within Victoria and throughout the province.




Lukas Dick Songhees


Seth Horne Quw'utsun


Shayla Lagis Kwakwaka' wakw

Kaydence is thankful for her family's support and help toward her graduation. She is attending Camosun College next year to study in the Early Learning & Care program.




Jason Lavis Métis/Cree

Madison has many great memories from her time at Esquimalt High School. She would like to thank all of the people who have supported her along the way, especially Mr. Beattie.




Clifford Seitcher Huuayaht

Olivia Gribbon Métis



Enrique would like to thank all those that supported him on his path towards graduation. He would also like to wish a bright future for all of the 2020 grads.








Rebecca Psaila Métis








Shauntelle Dick-Charleson Songhees & Hesquiaht

On behalf of the Indigenous Education Department, we raise our hands and acknowledge **Mark Albany** and **Gloria Cardinal** who retired from the Greater Victoria School District this year.

Mark is from the Songhees Nation, and was one of the Indigenous Student Counselors for the past 29 years. Mark was an itinerant counsellor and worked at many schools in the district at the elementary, middle and secondary levels. As well as his counseling role, for many years Mark offered cultural tours for teachers and staff during professional development days. The demand for his tours increased over the years and for the last part of his career he offered culture tours to whole classrooms where he brought students from all levels to areas that have cultural and historical significance to local Indigenous Nations. He shared important knowledge about traditional territory use; plants; medicines; clam beds; middens and Indigenous ways of knowing the land. Mark started with the district in July of 1990 and decided to retire in June 2019. He will be greatly missed and we want to thank him for sharing his skills and knowledge over his career with hundreds of students, teachers and staff. His countless environmental fieldtrips exploring the local beaches, rivers, parks and green spaces with school staff and students will be greatly missed. It was my absolute pleasure to work with Gloria for almost 10 years at Esquimalt High School.

She came in to my life and not only was she an Educational Assistant, she treated me like a daughter. She taught me many lessons that I will never forget. One story I have about her (and I have many) is when I asked her to join in on a counselling session with myself, another student and the student's grandmother. I was nervous about meeting with the grandmother because I was only a new mom and felt it would be good to have Gloria with me to give a grandma's perspective. Gloria was the exact medicine that the family needed. From that day on I have always looked up to Gloria as a loving, knowledgeable, generous person. While she worked as an Educational Assistant, she really was a teacher to me. She taught me to always think of others and to always give generously. It was because of her that we started to Gifting Program at Esquimalt High. Every Christmas Gloria would reach deep into her pockets and find ways to express her appreciation for everyone that she worked with, from the custodian to the admin, to the secretaries to many of the staff. While she lived humbly, she always found ways to give to others at the end of the year as well. Once again she would circulate around giving gifts to the admin, secretaries, custodian and staff. It was Gloria who started the idea of having Indigenous ties made as gifts for the male staff and painted rocks for the students. She helped us to start the making of the cedar boughs with the 4 ribbons tied on them. The cedar boughs adorned the tables at the Indigenous Grad Ceremony. The thing I will remember most about Gloria is how much we would laugh. We laughed so hard that our cheeks got sore and our bellies ached. We laughed at ourselves mostly. She ran our First Nations classroom like a home and family. She made sure everyone pitched in with doing dishes and helping with food prep and clean up. Everyone spoke respectfully and treated each other with kindness. She emulated that. Although she was an Educational Assistant, she was my teacher. She taught me to love, listen, laugh and be generous. She taught me about being Cree and how special that is. She taught me to be a proud Cree woman and to embrace my roots and for that I am truly grateful. My heart is full of love and my eyes are filled with tears because I am eternally grateful that Creator placed Gloria in my life." I am so happy for you Gloria as you journey on to your new life. I hope that the road reaches up to meet you and that you are blessed twice over with many gifts, as you always so generously give to others. Hiy Hiy Gloria for all of your love."
