Lay a Wreath

It wasn't until 1995 that the first wreath to commemorate Indigenous veterans was allowed to be laid in Ottawa. This practice has slowly increased over the years across the country. Schools are encouraged to lay a wreath on November 8th to honour Indigenous Veterans.

Look for local events happening at the Legislature on November 8th to recognize and remember Indigenous Veterans.

National Aboriginal Veterans Day November 8

On November 8, 1993 the first Indigenous Veteran's Day took place across Canada and in 1994 the day was officially recognized by the Government of Manitoba to honor the contributions of First Nations, Metis, and Inuit peoples who served in the Canadian Military. Six years later on June 21st, 2001 a national monument of bronze with a granite created by Indigenous artist Noel Lloyd Pinay of the Peepeekisis First Nation in Saskatchewan was unveiled in Confederation Park in Ottawa. Pinay was inspired by the dedication and sacrifice made by his father, Noel Joseph Pinay, who was a paratrooper during the Second World War. Using traditional symbols, Pinay brings the essential Aboriginal value of harmony with nature to the forefront. The inscription of the National Aboriginal Veterans Monument in Ottawa is very heartwarming. The national monument in Ottawa is featured in an important documentary by Loretta Todd. Forgotten Warriors (51 minutes, 1997) is streaming for free on the National Film Board's website. This powerful documentary film, nominated for a Genie award, remembers the World War II soldiers who risked their lives overseas only to return to find their land confiscated. Find this film here.

Five years later in 2002, Kwakwaka'wakw Totem Pole Artist Calvin Hunt was commissioned to create a totem pole at the Veterans Memorial Lodge in Broadmead near Victoria (Lekwungen and WSÁNEĆ territories). Another Kwakwaka'wakw artist, Andy Everson, created a poppy featuring four thunderbirds design in 2005 to honour the sacrifices made by men and women to ensure that we can live our lives in comparative peace.







National Inuit Day

November 7 is International Inuit Day. International Inuit Day is an opportunity to celebrate, listen to, and learn from Inuit from across the North. It is a day to honour the rich contributions and vibrant ways of knowing and being of Inuit across the globe.

With a rapidly changing world and climate, Inuit peoples are faced with the continued challeges of keeping traditional practices alive amid the pressures of a tech-filled, fast-paced world.

"...the world around Hudson Bay Inuit is rapidly transforming. Straddling the Arctic Circle, the region is in one of the fastest-warming places on the planet. Hunters today face conditions their ancestors never could have imagined, including thinning sea ice, disrupted seasons, and disturbed animal behaviours ... Inuit Qaujimajatuqangit, or IQ—the systematic "way of knowing" that has guided life here for millennia, and the IQ principle of qanuqtururangniq—finding innovative and resourceful solutions..." help guide Inuit communities and youth through these complex times.

Métis and the Bison

Like other harvesting practices such as fishing and agriculture, "Métis bison-hunting camps were highly organized and ruled in a strict military fashion, yet the Métis also practiced a form of consensual democracy during the hunt. 


Bison and Reconciliation






















What is happening with the IED Website?
