





Canoe Journeys

The annual canoe journey is a gathering of canoe cultures from Indigenous nations from coastal communities such as Alaska, British Columbia, Washington, and Oregon. The canoe journeys emerged after years of government oppression. It first took place in 1989 and since then, it has become an annual event attracting many Indigenous families and teams from around the Pacific Rim canoe culture.

Powwow Season

Powwows are powerful intergenerational gatherings that promote culture and community. They are large gatherings with representations of Indigenous groups across Canada. In the nineteenth century, powwows became homecoming celebrations when families and communities who were separated by government policies, could be reunited.

Today powwows are a place for people to meet and celebrate traditional Indigenous singing, dancing, and culture. It is a time for Indigenous people to honor and preserve their heritage. A powwow is a place for Indigenous people to demonstrate the strength and vitality of their culture and legacy. As national Indigenous Day approaches on June 21, it marks the beginning of the powwow trail
