

Ideas for Orange Shirt Day



Here is a lesson plan idea shared by Caitlin Baker.
Make Orange Shirt Day heart pins with orange wool roving, a felting needle, and a heart-shaped cookie cutter. Felt the wool inside the cutter on a sponge, shaping both sides. Smooth edges, then glue or sew on a pin back. Trim excess fibers. Let dry—your handmade pin is ready!










The Held by the Land book and card deck are teaching tools that connect students to Indigenous ways of knowing and relationships with the land. In class, you can use the book for stories, teachings, and reflections, and the cards as prompts for discussion, journaling, or group activities. Each card offers an entry point for conversation, art, or land-based learning, helping students reflect on their own relationship with the natural world while learning respect for Indigenous perspectives.
